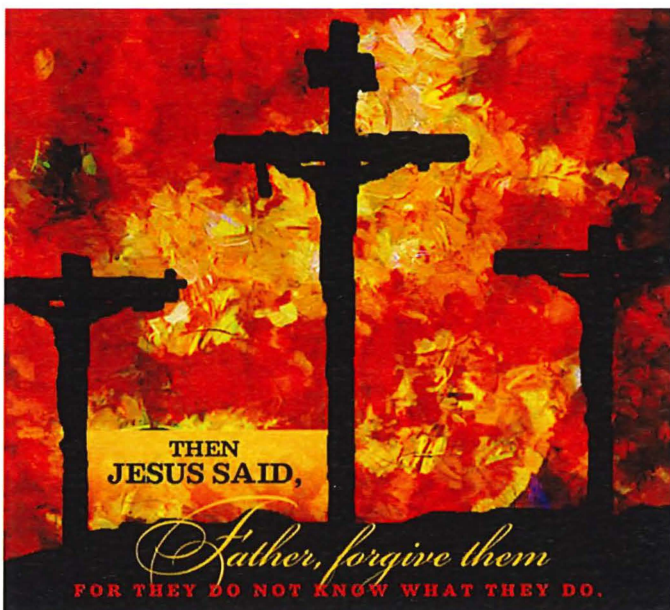

The Negro National Anthem: "Lift Every Voice and Sing"

by James Weldon Johnson (June 17, 1871 - June 26, 1938)

Originally written by Johnson for a presentation in celebration of the birthday of Abraham Lincoln. This was originally performed in Jacksonville, Florida, by children. The popular title for this work is:

'THE NEGRO NATIONAL ANTHEM'

Lift every voice and sing
Till earth and heaven ring,
Ring with the harmonies of Liberty;
Let our rejoicing rise
High as the listening skies,
Let it resound loud as the rolling sea.
Sing a song full of the faith that the dark past has taught us,
Sing a song full of the hope that the present has brought us,
Facing the rising sun of our new day begun
Let us march on till victory is won.

Stony the road we trod,
Bitter the chastening rod,
Felt in the days when hope unborn had died;
Yet with a steady beat,
Have not our weary feet
Come to the place for which our fathers sighed?
We have come over a way that with tears have been watered,
We have come, treading our path through the blood of the slaughtered,
Out from the gloomy past,
Till now we stand at last
Where the white gleam of our bright star is cast.

God of our weary years,
God of our silent tears,
Thou who has brought us thus far on the way;
Thou who has by Thy might
Led us into the light,
Keep us forever in the path, we pray.
Lest our feet stray from the places, Our God, where we met Thee;
Lest, our hearts drunk with the wine of the world, we forget Thee;
Shadowed beneath Thy hand,
May we forever stand.

Seeing the hand of God:

The New Testament writers would often refer to the lives of Old Testament men and women. In this way, they could encourage believers and remind them how the Lord worked in previous generations. (Hebrews 12:1-2) There are Spirit led principles that guided the saints of old that are practical and relevant for Christians today to apply to our lives. (Hebrews 12:3-29) No one can claim to have seen God physically. But every Christian has the capacity to discern God and His work in the world. The obvious way to do so is to read the Bible. In the word of God we learn who He is, Jesus is Savior, we are sinners, and that there exist a heaven and hell. Further, we can learn how the Lord works, His expectations, and His promises. Black History Trivia Contest—Questions will be placed in the bulletin each Sunday during the month of February. Prizes will be awarded. All are welcome to test your knowledge.

Famous African Americans Past and Present—Each Sunday during the morning worship service, **youth and young adults** of the church will select a noted African American and share information about that person with the congregation.
